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




Social Mission/key social objectives

Eikra Activity is a social enterprise that provides training and employment-oriented programs aimed at people with reduced work capacity and those at risk of prolonged social exclusion, especially youth and non-native speakers. The goal is to promote learning, mastery, development, and well-being.

Background

Eikra Activity, established in 2009, is a social enterprise and a non-profit organization that offers services through "Inn på tunet" in Trøndelag.

Year established: 2009

Numbers employed: 6 people

Range of activities

- Employment-oriented programs for people at risk of social exclusion
- Job training for youth
- Integration programs for immigrant women
- Uses the farm as an educational resource for primary school students.

Target groups/clients

The target groups are school students, youth, non-native speakers, people at risk of prolonged social exclusion, and others struggling to enter the job market.

Business Model

Eikra Activity is funded through government grants, income from services primarily



















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delivered to the public sector, and some support from foundations and volunteer organizations. The organization is financially sustainable by reinvesting all profits into new innovation projects that support participants and the community. The unique aspect of Eikra Activity is the use of a farm as a learning arena, where practical tasks are combined with theoretical education, providing a holistic and effective learning process.

Lessons learnt/Tips for success

- The combination of specialized expertise, different generations, animals, nature, and a facilitated environment, provided through a farm, has proven effective in promoting mastery and growth among participants.
- Using practical learning in a safe and supportive environment contributes to good progression, personal development, and inclusion.
- Close collaboration with municipal services, professional directorates, administrative agencies, and national competence centers focusing on innovation, impact measurement, and conceptualization has granted us access to several long-term national projects.
- Utilizing external specialized expertise for business development and impact measurement is crucial for success.

- Access to capital for further development and upgrading of facilities, etc.

What supports have been most useful to the development?

- Support from various external business developers and organizations with expertise in social entrepreneurship and social sustainability.
